Podemos as a response to the crisis

Podemos has emerged as a sound political alternative willing to contest the mandate of the financial and political elites through new, radically democratic means.

In keeping with its agenda to activate inclusive and horizontal channels of political participation, Podemos does not merely address the concerns of ordinary people but provides a public sphere in which these demands can be voiced, debated and collectively influence political decisions on a government level.

Círculos and Podemos London

Linked from its origins to grass-roots social movements such as 15-M, Podemos is a direct response to dominant political class in Spain, and instead seeks to empower citizens through its nearly 1000 "círculos" or local groups, which are based on popular assembly structures.

The purview has extended further afield as thousands of men and women have been forced to move abroad by the dismal work situation in Spain, and are now setting up their own "círculos".

Podemos London is one among the many "círculos" to have been constituted abroad, and we are eager to continue the pedagogical and activist work initiated in Spain and establish a dialogue with other grassroots movements across the UK.

Our Speakers

Tania González Peñas (Avilés, 1983) is a social activist for a number of social movements in Spain. She holds a BA in Political Sciences, and has cultivated a special interest in subjects concerning gender, social equality and employment. She is one the 5 MEPs of Podemos in the European Parliament, and her daily work is focused now on her role as spokeswoman on behalf of different social movements as well as communicating the demands of Spanish citizens to the European government in Brussels.

Owen Jones is a columnist for the Guardian and a frequent broadcaster. His first book, *Chavs: The Demonization of the Working Class*, was published by Verso in June 2011 to considerable acclaim and attention, and became the bestselling political book of 2011. Chavs was longlisted for the Guardian First Book Award and picked by the New York Times as one of their Top 10 Non-fiction Books of 2011. Owen has been named one of the Daily Telegraph's Most Influential People on the Left, and won Left Foot Forward's poll for Most Influential Left-Wing Thinker of the Year, and Young Writer of the Year at the 2013 Political Book Awards.. His second book, *The Establishment And How They Get Away With It*, was published in 2014 by Allen Lane/ Penguin Press.

Ken Loach was born in 1936 in Nuneaton. He attended King Edward VI Grammar School and went on to study law at St. Peter's Hall, Oxford. After a brief spell in the theatre, Loach was recruited by the BBC in 1963 as a television director. This launched a long career directing films for television and the cinema, from Cathy Come Home and Kes in the sixties to Land And Freedom, Sweet Sixteen and The Wind That Shakes The Barley in recent years. His 2013 documentary film The Spirit of '45 has examined the pivotal socio-political changes under the Labour government of Clement Attlee which reshaped postwar Britain.
